THE MAGIC DIARY


Diaries are like magic. They can predict the future. To perform this magic we look for patterns of change in the things we write about. However, there are several kinds of changes taking place in the environment around us. First there are **seasonal** changes. If you keep regular notes, your diary will help you work out the usual pattern of events in your locality and the places where they happen. This will let you build up local timelines (see P. 7) and local distribution maps (see P. 12). Soon you will be able to predict next year's events and where animals and plants will usually be found.

Then there are **evolutionary** changes. Things and places around you slowly grow up and grow old. If you can regularly measure them in some way and note them down in this book, you will be able to work out how fast they are changing. Soon you will start to see large scale movements and trends in animal and plant populations.

Finally there are **catastrophic** changes like drought, floods, bushfires, storms and bulldozing. The catastrophe is usually the climax of a series of tiny, apparently unrelated changes. You may have the clues and the early warning signs to these in your diary and be able to prepare so that the catastrophe does not become a disaster. Listing wildlife casualties, describing bush damage or noting reactions will make an excellent base for future survey or census work as the bush recovers.

You can see how valuable diaries can be. They can even help to save lives and make important scientific discoveries.


